

COMMON CORE AND NEXT GENERATION SCIENCE STANDARDS ALIGNED ACTIVITIES



Kindergarten: NGSS K-ESS3-3. Communicate solutions that will reduce the impact of humans on the land, water, air, and/or other living things in the local environment.

After reading "Pet Corner: Are pet fish happy?", ask students what kids need to be happy, healthy and safe. Make a list. Then, ask students where fish live when they are not pets. What do fish need to survive and be happy in their habitats? Is this different from what kids need? If so, how? Students may say that fish need clean water to live in; whereas, humans need clean air to breathe. Ask students what they can do to help fish live happy lives. Help them think of ways they can

reduce trash that pollutes oceans, lakes and rivers, such as reducing their plastic use, or cleaning up after themselves carefully after visiting a body of water. To extend the activity, look into whether there is a community clean-up in your area that the class could take part in or students could choose to go to with their families.

First grade: CCSS.ELA-LITERACY.W.1.3. Write narratives in which they recount two or more appropriately sequenced events, include some details regarding what happened, use temporal words to signal event order, and provide some sense of closure.

After reading "Corbin & Zane: A Special Friendship," ask students how Corbin acts as a friend to Zane. What does he do for him? Then, ask students to think about or imagine someone who helps them and is there for them. What does this person or animal do to help them? Accept responses and write down examples students give. Then, ask students to write about a time that a special person or animal (real or imagined) helped them and be sure to answer the following questions:

- 1. What did they need help with?
- **2.** What specific things did the person or animal do for them?
- **3.** How did they feel after being helped?

To extend the activity, visit RedRover.org/corbinblog and read Zane's essay about Corbin aloud to students, Then, challenge them to write the story of their own friend without revealing the friend's identity until the end, just like Zane did.

Second grade: CCSS.ELA-LITERACY.SL.2.4. Tell a story or recount an experience with appropriate facts and relevant, descriptive details, speaking audibly in coherent sentences.

After reading "Corbin & Zane: A Special Friendship," ask students how they learned about Corbin (through Zane's descriptions in his interview with *Kind News*). Then, divide students into pairs to interview someone that they do not already know well. Brainstorm what they will need to ask their classmate in order to get to know them, such as favorite food, hobbies, who they live with, and whether they have any pets. Before having students begin their interviews, take time to go over practices for good listening. Give students time to interview each other and then report back to the class one interesting thing they learned about the other person. Afterwards, ask what they found easy about the experience. Challenging? Were they always comfortable talking about themselves or the other person? Why or why not?

Our mystery critter is the hamster. Hamsters were brought over to the U.S. in the 1930s from Syria. Although they are often kept as pets, in the wild they live in warm, dry areas such as the edges of deserts. They dig burrows with many tunnels for shelter during the hot days, and even create separate areas for eating and sleeping! Hamsters are crepuscular and forage for food at dawn or dusk, living on a diet of fruit, vegetables, grass and seeds, which they carry to their burrows in their large cheek pouches.


Many people opt to get a hamster as a pet because they are small animals—those kept as pets are typically 2-6 inches long. However, hamsters are solitary animals and don't bond with humans easily. The fact that they sleep during the day makes bonding a challenge as well. They can often bite and don't typically make good pets for small children. People looking for a small pet may find a domestic rat to be a good companion, since rats are naturally social pack animals.

If you feel you're able to meet the specific needs of a hamster, adopt one from a shelter or rescue. Be sure to get a wire-mesh cage and provide your hamster plenty of entertainment, such as an exercise wheel, ladder and toys such as toilet paper rolls, and provide many hard items for chewing. Ensure your hamster gets fresh water and hamster mix that includes grains, fruits and vegetables. Allow him to run free outside his cage for a period each day in a safe area.


