Understanding a Text	<p>Make predictions using prior knowledge, pictures, and text.</p> <p>Retell a main event from the story heard or read.</p> <p>Ask questions about the important characters, settings and events.</p> <p>Make predictions about the content of a text using prior knowledge and text features and explain whether they were confirmed or disconfirmed and why.</p> <p>Restate main ideas.</p>	<p>Identify the speaker of the poem.</p> <p>Make judgments about setting, characters, and events and support them with evidence from the text.</p> <p>Distinguish cause from effect.</p> <p>Summarize main ideas and supporting details.</p>	
Making Connections	Identify similarities and differences between the characters or events in a literary work and the actual experiences in an author's life.		
Theme	Relate themes in works of fiction and nonfiction to personal experience.		
Fiction	Identify the elements of plot, character, and setting in a favorite story.		Identify and analyze the elements of setting, characterization, and plot (including conflict).
