Giving hearts and hands — thank you to our volunteers!

WHEREVER THE SETTING, WE KNOW WE ARE MAKING A DIFFERENCE FOR ANIMALS AND THEIR PEOPLE.

RedRover Responders volunteers are crucial in helping animals impacted by natural disasters. Often we're on the ground helping just days after disaster strikes. Our teams care for evacuated pets, and also animals rescued from the field, providing daily care, helping with intake and reunification, and managing supply and food donations. We work in emergency animal shelters set up in impacted communities, and sometimes we are stationed directly at a community's brick and mortar shelter caring for evacuated and rescued animals.

Planning ahead is the key to keeping yourself and your pets safe when crisis strikes. In the midst of disaster season, with wildfires burning all over the country, and hurricanes in the Gulf and Atlantic Ocean, the destruction from natural disasters can be hard to watch. And if you love animals it is even harder because of how they are impacted by fires, hurricanes, and other emergencies. But there is a way you can actively help to relieve their suffering — by deploying as a **RedRover Responders** volunteer.

Joining our team of caring and hardworking volunteers includes answering the call to other types of crisis, like taking care of animals rescued from hoarding cases or puppy mills. **RedRover Responders** volunteers also assist with cat TNR (Trap-Neuter-Return) programs, build pet-friendly housing at domestic violence shelters, help with projects to unchain dogs who live outside, and assist at community vaccination clinics.

If you already are a RedRover Responders volunteer and have not deployed lately, consider getting back in the action! We hope the experienced volunteers who have seen the positive impact of our work can say "yes!" to the next deployment request, and continue to help bring comfort, care, and hope to animals and their people. You are the Responders program, and the only reason why all of us together have helped in over 265 total deployments - including 19 in the past year alone (helping almost 3,000 animals). We love and thank you, and all our volunteers, and hope to see you in the field soon! 🖤

- Care for animals displaced by natural disasters and reunite them with their families
- Care for animals rescued from cruelty cases: puppy mills and other abuse/neglect situations
- Set up and operate temporary emergency animal shelters
- Help build on-site pet housing at domestic violence shelters
- Assist in Trap-Neuter-Return (TNR) events and community veterinary clinics including wellness, vaccination, and spay/neuter services

The 25 by 2025 campaign launch and the power of community

THIS SUMMER, REDROVER ANNOUNCED THE OFFICIAL LAUNCH OF OUR 25 BY 2025 CAMPAIGN – a

movement to help ensure that 25% of domestic violence (DV) shelters in the U.S. are pet friendly by the year 2025.

We've teamed up with Greater Good Charities' Rescue Rebuild program, with support from Purina, and power from PetSmart Charities to achieve this. At the 49th annual National Organization for Victim Assistance (NOVA) training event in New Orleans, we introduced the campaign to the public. Attendees were so excited to show us photos of their pet family members, and also shared stories about survivors they have worked with in the past or present, who have faced the difficult decision between safety and their pets. They told us about the impact that pets have on survivors' lives, how difficult it can be to leave an abuser without their pet, and how hard it is to not have resources to offer for the pets of survivors.

The 25 by 2025 team kicked off the campaign with a special presentation and discussion via Zoom call. From all over the US and Canada, 85 people joined the call to learn more about the benefits of being a pet-friendly shelter, funding opportunities, and upcoming trainings hosted by RedRover and Greater Good Charities' collaborative program, Don't Forget the Pets. ♥




25 by **2025**

We've just wrapped up Domestic Violence Awareness Month (DVAM)! On Purple Thursday, October 19, supporters of the 25 by 2025 campaign from all over the country shared their 2023 DVAM t-shirts on their social media with the hashtags **#25by2025** and **#petsarefamily**.

As of August's end, together our efforts have increased pet-friendly domestic violence shelters nationwide from **17%** to **18.7%**.

REDROVER HAS AWARDED \$254,643 IN SAFE HOUSING GRANTS

in this funding round, thanks in part to Purina and PetSmart Charities! This cycle, five domestic violence shelters and two



animal shelters were awarded Safe Housing grants, including *two newly petfriendly shelters.

RedRover Director of Outreach and Collaboration, Katie Campbell, said, "Pets are family. All too often survivors will not leave an abuser if they can't take their pet, for fear of what may happen. With each grant awarded we are creating a pathway to help more domestic violence survivors and their beloved pets escape abuse and start a new life free from harm."

From vacation to the vet: Zolä's Happy Tail

ISAIAH WAS ENJOYING VACATION WITH HIS FAMILY AND SWEET PUP

ZOLÄ WHEN, completely unprovoked, the little toy fox terrier was attacked by a dog twice her size. The people

responsible for this dog were sitting in their car during the entire ordeal, and Isaiah and his family had to rush Zolä to an emergency veterinary hospital.

Zolä underwent surgery out of town, with four puncture wounds and a massive wound on her right flank. And when Isaiah brought her home, she developed an alarming infection. She would need to be treated at the local veterinarian overnight while she received a constant drip of heavyduty antibiotics. With no help from the family of the other dog, Isaiah found

himself in a tough position — Zolä needed more treatment immediately, and additional visits to the veterinarian as the wound healed to prevent it from becoming septic.

Isaiah applied for a RedRover Relief Urgent Care grant while Zolä was

treated, and once approved, Isaiah had raised enough funds to "get her over the finish line and out of the woods." His deep love for his baby girl was evident, and soon little Zolä was well once again.

"Zolä's doing really well. I greatly appreciate that, more than you know. She's all I have. She doesn't bark, she always smiles, and life wouldn't be the same without her. I think we move so fast through life that we forget that the small things really do matter."

Seventh-grade Humane Hero helps pets in need

REED PEACHEY'S CAT, CARROT, IS A SNUGGLER, A PLAYMATE, AND

ALSO A MUSE. Rescued as a tiny kitten eight years ago by the executive director at Beesley Animal Foundation in Murfreesboro, Tennessee where Reed's mother worked, he was adopted by the family and quickly stole Reed's heart. Within just a few years, Reed had become a member of the service-oriented Beta Club at his elementary school, and knew exactly where to give his time.

As a volunteer for Beesley's outreach program, Reed helps address a community food shortage by making packages of dog and cat food to be shared with food banks, churches, and senior centers. "People who were already struggling to feed themselves would still share food with their pets," explains Reed's mother Katie. "Neither was getting the nutrients they needed." After Reed is done packing food for the day, he'll take a walk to the cats at Beesley's animal clinic. "That's my payment, seeing the cats," he says. "A lot of them will meow at me and rub against the cage."

Now in seventh grade, Reed is one of five "Humane Heroes" profiled this school year in RedRover's *Kind News*™ Magazine, which Beesley Animal
