

In that role, I supported all of the outreach, awareness, and capacity-building efforts, especially for our domestic

violence assistance programs, our fastest growing program.

THE REDROVER READERS TEAM **KICKED OFF 2024 WITH A SPECIAL**

TRAINING for RedRover Readers workshop facilitators. These individuals are now prepared to show more educators how to use the program, and more students will benefit through building life skills, kindness, and empathy!



In addition, thanks to Dr. Sarah M. Straub at Stephen F. Austin State University in Texas, ten of her graduate students attended our on-demand training option as part of their course work in Education Studies!

Dr. Straub holds the Montgomery Professorship for Humane Education at Stephen F. Austin State University, where she spearheads efforts to integrate humane education into both the university curriculum and the wider community. As part of her initiatives, she has forged a longstanding partnership with the RedRover Readers program, collaborating for several years to promote empathy and compassion through education. Through the Professorship, Dr. Straub has secured funding to support local area teachers, undergraduate, and graduate students, enabling a total of 30 certifications in humane education, enriching the educational landscape and fostering a culture of empathy and kindness.

"As an English language arts, reading, and social studies teacher, reading and literature is a passion of mine. I was super excited that reading aloud humane themed books and asking meaningful questions could be used to teach empathy and compassion to young children. One of the aha moments was the realization that specific open-ended questions guide students to think critically and promote the development of empathy and compassion towards animals and humans."

Broadening our Impact, Powered by Volunteers

OUR REDROVER RESPONDERS PROGRAM HAS UNDERGONE ENORMOUS CHANGE AND GROWTH

OVER THE DECADES since RedRover was founded in 1987 as United Animal Nations. We were one of the first programs to help animals in disasters when the field was in its infancy in the late 1980s and early 1990s. Our volunteers back then numbered in the hundreds, and we assisted when few groups were doing this kind of work.

We helped animals in Hurricane Katrina, now seen as a turning point in recognition that disaster response must also include rescuing and caring for animals. Out of that disaster, there was recognition that animal disaster response could be so much better, and RedRover was one leading organization that helped to form the National Animal Rescue and Sheltering Coalition (NARSC) in 2006, dedicated to improving animal disaster response.

Through the early 2000s to the co-founding of NARSC, the Responders program focused on providing the hands-on animal care of those impacted by disasters. We became nationally recognized for emergency animal sheltering. And not just in disasters—we also assisted in caring for animals rescued from cruelty and neglect, such as in puppy mill and hoarding cases. By then, our volunteers numbered in the thousands, and we were deploying across the country 10–15 times a year.

We became a go-to organization because of our volunteers; in this area we were uniquely volunteer-driven, with only a single staff field responder. Other organizations and jurisdictions loved working with us because of our volunteers — we came in and provided excellent care, showed kindness and compassion, were committed to being drama-free, and simply worked hard to get the job done.

And this has not changed! Now totaling more than 4,800 RedRover Responders volunteers, we are known by the wonderful work we do and how easy we are to work alongside. We are and always have been powered by the best volunteer corps in this kind of work.

In addition to our disaster and cruelty responses, we are committed to helping some of the most under-resourced

communities take care of the animals they love through our Community Programs work. We now assist these communities with vaccination, wellness, spay/neuter clinics, and building on-site housing for domestic violence survivors' pets. Through our Unchaining and Winter Ready work, volunteers build enclosures for dogs and also provide them with all-weather housing. Through our Coastal Cats initiative volunteers assist at TNVR (Trap-Neuter-Vaccinate-Return) weekends specifically targeted in areas where community cats are most at risk by hurricanes and storm surge.

While the RedRover Responders program has developed and grown over the years, it has and always will be powered by volunteers who step up to help bring animals from crisis to care.

Veterinary Care for Pets and Families in Need

REDROVER'S URGENT CARE
GRANT CASE MANAGERS review
a high volume of requests every day,
so we follow procedures to ensure
we're looking at each application
fairly and equitably.

A case manager reviews every application we receive. And to eliminate any possible sources of bias, we only look at the animal and needed treatment information; we do not view the pet owner's name or location.

RedRover's Urgent Care grant case managers are all animal lovers. We look at every application for reasons to say YES, and we're



always so grateful when we can make a positive difference in the lives of people and their pets.

The requests we're most likely able to help with are those where only a small gap in funding is keeping an animal from receiving urgent care. The most common issues we help with are dental extractions, growth removals, and bladder stone removals. In cases where we are unable to help, we offer resources, such as recommending lower-cost veterinarians in their area and other organizations that may be able to assist.

The Pet-Friendly Movement to Support Survivors

25 BY 2025

FOR OUR REDROVER RELIEF **DOMESTIC VIOLENCE ASSISTANCE PROGRAMMING, 2023 WAS A BIG**

YEAR! We launched the 25 by 2025 campaign to help ensure that 25% of domestic violence (DV) shelters become pet friendly by the end of 2025. Why create this campaign? Because we know that pets belong with their people, and all too often



DV survivors will delay leaving an abuser — or never leave if they can't bring their pets with them.

We created the campaign to amplify the momentum we've witnessed over the last several years, and to make sure that organizations know that we're here to support their journey to becoming pet friendly.

And now nearly 19% of DV shelters in the U.S. can welcome pets onsite! That means we're just 6% away from reaching our 25 by 2025 goal. For some context, when the Safe Housing grant program began in 2012, just 3% of DV shelters were pet friendly.

With just 6% to go, we need roughly 116 shelters to become pet friendly. In 2024, we'll continue to reach more organizations by attending several

national and regional conferences, and our Don't Forget the Pets (DFTP) collaborative project will continue to expand and grow:

- We'll offer at least six in-person workshops across the country.
- We'll host at least one "guest presentation" each quarter.
- And we just launched our revamped website with an expanded blog section and a brand new "video library" offering training recordings and "deep dive" videos.




RedRover Financials

Together, you gave a total of \$5,407,412 for pets and their families in 2023. RedRover received a Top-Rated Award from Great Nonprofits. a four-star rating from Charity Navigator, and a GuideStar Platinum Seal of Transparency yet again. In 2023, 80¢ of every dollar was spent on lifesaving programs, and 20¢ was services. We are grateful to have closed 2023 with \$7,346,284 in net assets.



RedRover Relief

PROVIDES FINANCIAL AND EMOTIONAL SUPPORT to Good Samaritans.

- **586*** pets received urgent veterinary treatment with \$184,989.98 in financial assistance
- **5,637** animals were helped through consultation and other referrals from RedRover staff
- Urgent Care grant requests increased by nearly 30% from 2022 to 2023
 - *includes grants awarded and pets helped through RedRover's pilot Access to Veterinary Care Fund



- **338** animals escaped abuse and 13,760 nights of pet boarding was provided through RedRover's Safe Escape grant program
- 890 estimated DV survivors' pets helped through RedRover's Safe Housing grant program

25 BY **2025**

How has the percentage of pet-friendly domestic violence shelters increased to 19%?

Just last year alone we:

- Trained or presented to more than 3,500 individuals about our DV assistance programming and through our Don't Forget the Pets (DFTP) collaborative project
- Hosted 19 DFTP workshops for 229 in-person attendees and 106 virtual "attendees"
- Found that 84% of Safe Housing grantees have taken a DFTP workshop
- Worked with our partners at DomesticShelters.org to ensure that pet housing options are accurately listed so survivors have the information they need, when they need it
- Provided more than \$1.1M in Safe Housing grants funding (we also surpassed \$4M in Safe Housing grants awarded since the program was established!)

RedRover Responders

SHELTERS AND CARES for animals displaced by natural disasters and other crises, provides hands-on assistance with building pet housing for domestic violence survivors, and offers community assistance for animals in need in the United States and Canada.

- **2,076** animals in crisis were helped through emergency sheltering and care services
- **608** more animals were helped through expert advice and valuable resources from RedRover staff
- **2,861** hours of volunteer work providing direct sheltering and animal care services



Last year, we formed a new partnership with Paws of Northeast Louisiana, providing a free wellness clinic that brought such a huge turnout the event had to be shut down to new attendees. We expanded our work on the Navajo Nation, bringing our Unchaining program to the reservation, as well as winter preparation for dogs: providing dog houses, straw, enrichment, and new lightweight tethers for outdoor dogs.

safety, and travel challenges due to COVID, the future of the program was unclear. That first year RedRover's Field Services and Community Programs Manager Devon Krusko took the journey to new partners alone, helping with transport programs, shelter operations, and training. That November we deployed with our friends at the Humane Society of Marlboro County to assist with an Unchaining pilot program that builds safe enclosures for dogs that live outside.

As we connected with more communities, we officially launched our Community Programs initiative in

2022 with free veterinary services, wellness clinics,

- 2,054 new children were taught how to develop empathy for animals
- 16 readings and classroom visits conducted
- 92 new volunteers, teachers, and educators were trained via 9 training workshops
- 123,361 total estimated children reached through the RedRover Readers program to date

Additionally, the **RedRover Readers** On-Demand online workshop received 55 total registered participants! That's 55 more educators who will be able to help children build life skills, kindness, and empathy through our story-based curriculum.
