

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Bridging Worlds Through Empathy: A Reflection on RedRover Readers

AT REDROVER, WE BELIEVE IN THE **POWER OF STORIES TO CONNECT. INSPIRE, AND BUILD EMPATHY.**

Christina Gavranovic, a graduate student of Dr. Sarah Straub at Stephen F. Austin State University, recently completed the RedRover Readers online workshop. For Christina, the workshop was more than just a training — it was a transformative experience that reaffirmed her belief in the role of empathy in bridging the gap between Deaf and hearing communities, as a member of the Deaf and Hard of Hearing community herself. As she reflected, "This training did not just teach me to ask better questions; it showed me how to listen - to really listen - with an open heart and without judgment."

Using the book Lucky Boy, by Susan Boase, she engaged her son Michael in open-ended discussions that sparked emotional connections and deeper comprehension. Watching him connect with the characters reminded her how "powerful literature can be in shaping how we view ourselves and others."

Christina envisions how the RedRover Readers program could foster understanding in classrooms by adapting discussions to align with Deaf culture, incorporating ASL into storytelling, and ensuring inclusive participation. She recognizes the challenges but remains committed to advocating for more accessible and empathetic learning spaces.



Her story is a powerful reminder of the impact humane education can have in creating classrooms where every student feels seen, heard, and valued - regardless of how they communicate.

Cross-Country Community Care



OUR REDROVER RESPONDERS WORK TAKES US ALL OVER THE COUNTRY TO PROVIDE VITAL, LIFE-

SAVING SERVICES and support for pets and their people. Our team spent the first weeks of 2025 traveling to 5 different states, serving 760 animals!

We started in Florida partnering with our friends at Operation Catnip to provide a weekend of TNVR (trapneuter-vaccinate-return) services for more than 20 individual caretakers and 185 cats, thanks to funding from our friends at BISSELL Pet Foundation. The Coastal Cats program specifically focuses on areas where cats are at high risk due to hurricanes. We not only provided important spay/neuter surgeries and vaccines, proven to reduce the number of outdoor kitties and the spread of disease, but lifesaving veterinary care that greatly reduced suffering, such as eye enucleations and a leg amputation.

With the last cat safely released back to their home, we continued West to Arizona to join The Parker Project in offering door-to-door wellness and veterinary care on the Navajo Nation. We were honored to assist The Parker Project team with their new veterinary mobile unit. For the first time, we were able to bring free spay/neuter surgeries and vaccines directly to those who need it most - that's right, high-quality veterinary care in their driveway! Because of the lack of access to care on the reservation, in addition to many families caring for multiple dogs, projects like this are absolutely vital.

On our first day, we worked with two families that each had more than 15 animals—imagine

how difficult it would be to not only afford care but to drive them to the vet!

The end of February brought us to North Carolina for our first deployment with our new partner, Dogs Deserve Better Piedmont. Over two days we built safe enclosures for dogs that live outside, providing them with new fencing, canopies to protect them from the elements, dog houses, enrichment, and food. With limited resources, families were beyond grateful for their improvement in quality of life for both their doggos and themselves!

Our last stop was unique—a weekend project at two different locations in two different states, bringing us to Alabama

and Mississippi! Partnering with
The Pretty Pittie Committee, The
Mobile SPCA, and Advanced Pet Care,
our team provided veterinary services
to 322 well-loved pets. From spay/
neuter surgery to vaccines to flea/tick
prevention, the RedRover Responders
team assisted with recovering animals
from surgery, trimming nails, and
preparing medications.

By the end of the month, thanks to 3 team leads, 18 volunteers, and 4 incredible local organizations, 760 animals were able to access care they otherwise wouldn't have been able to—and that is a wonderful thing to be a part of!

PETS (DFTP), has already kicked off an exciting year of workshops and special events! RedRover President and CEO, Katie Campbell, and her co-presenter Bryna Donnelly, Executive Vice President of Programs for Greater Good Charities, made their first stops in Pennsylvania and Ohio. Later this year, you'll find them leading workshops in Missouri, California, New Jersey, Texas, and Illinois!





The Housing People and Pets in Crisis workshop has served as a touchstone event for the project since 2019. YEAR! While there's still work to do to help ensure that 25% of domestic violence (DV) shelters are pet friendly by the end of 2025, we're grateful to be able to celebrate along with the help of our campaign partners Greater Good Charities, PetSmart Charities, and Purina, that we are nearly at 19.5%. With your help, we keep moving the needle forward! And that "we" is a very important piece of the puzzle.

Whether you are a part of the 25 by 2025 campaign as an advocate whose shelter is pet friendly, an

organization in the process of becoming pet friendly, come from the animal sheltering or veterinary world—or you simply understand the importance of keeping domestic violence survivors with their pets—each individual supporter of keeping DV survivors and pets together plays an important role in this national movement.

"I fostered and adopted her so she could be out of the shelter sooner; as a blind senior dog, she was very overwhelmed in the shelter environment. Sweet Pea has a recurrent mammary mass that has begun to rupture. She had some mammary masses removed at the time of her spay, which happened while she was Sweet Pea under the shelter's care. She is just the sweetest thing, which is what we named her. It took her nearly a year after being adopted for her to emotionally heal and feel secure and confident. I want her to know love, and security and to feel the best she can for as long as possible. Since her adoption, I've gone from being a healthcare professional to being on disability, which has greatly reduced my income, and I need some help."

"Sweet Pea is doing so well now!

I can't thank you all enough. With the assistance for the mass removal. I was able to afford the biopsy as well, which has given me peace of mind. I couldn't be happier with the news and am glad we'll have more time with her. Since

I adopted her just a couple of years ago, I want her to have more time knowing love and comfort. Please thank your generous donors who helped to give this deserving senior more time to be loved and spoiled!"

"Bibi has been diagnosed with gingivitis, causing her gums to

become inflamed. She needs dental work to treat the condition. Bibi loves treats, but she hasn't been eating any recently. She came into my life during a period of severe depression. Initially, she was very shy, timid, and often hiding. She didn't like snuggling at all. One time, I was so sick that I couldn't get out of bed so my daughter brought her to my bedside. To my surprise, she let me snuggle her and stayed with me for a few hours without moving. I felt so warm and loved. She knew how I was feeling and was giving me her best compassion. She is an angel in my life."

"I want to express my heartfelt gratitude for the financial assistance you provided for Bibi's dental procedure. In this challenging time, your support means the world to us. Thanks to your help, Bibi can now receive the timely treatment she needs to restore her health."

"Cornelius is a very special boy who came home after my first bunny, Charley, did bunny speed-dating at the shelter and picked Cornelius and his sister, Astrid, to be his siblings. Watching the three of them bond has been one of the most rewarding experiences of my life. I've since lost Charley, and Astrid and Cornelius have been my biggest emotional support through these devastating losses. I made a commitment the day I brought him home to take care of him, which is why I am applying for this grant. He has a middle ear infection, causing facial nerve deficits, pain, and deafness. The middle ear infection can progress to an inner ear infection, causing balance issues and decreasing his

The mission of RedRover is to bring animals out of crisis and strengthen the bond between people and animals through emergency sheltering, disaster relief services, financial assistance, and education. RedRover accomplishes its mission by engaging volunteers and supporters, collaborating with others, and maximizing the use of online technology.



RedRover broke records in 2024 – thanks to you!

WE'RE THRILLED TO SHARE THAT 2024 WAS A RECORD YEAR FOR REDROVER'S WORK SUPPORTING PETS AND FAMILIES! Through our collaborative projects, community programs, and amazing partners, we assisted neighborhoods, classrooms, and families across the country. Your support helps us offer vital services to pets and people in times of crisis, including domestic violence survivors, disaster victims, and those facing economic hardship. We're proud to say your contributions help us support families who love their pets.

Volunteer Heroes

Our volunteers gave more than 2,960 hours in 2024 — providing veterinary assistance, warm spaces for DV survivors and pets, safe enclosures for outside dogs, and more. The fair market value of volunteer hours in 2024 came to \$99,130.


RedRover Financials

You and RedRover's generous supporters gave \$5,254,005 for the animals last year. We're thankful to have you as a part of our community. ♥

Named a Top-Rated charity by Charity Watchdog for another year in a row, in part due to your charitable support, this recognition is a testament to our commitment to transparency and accountability. In 2024, 79¢ of every dollar was spent on important programs to support communities, and 21¢ was spent on supporting services. We finished the 2024 year with \$8,289,218 in net assets.



RedRover Readers and Kind News

A UNIQUE SOCIAL AND EMOTIONAL LEARNING (SEL) PROGRAM that helps children develop empathy and explore the bond between people and animals through stories and discussion, is now available with online resources for at-home learning. In 2024, RedRover Readers made a significant impact in



- Connecting 7,966 new children with the program who were taught how to develop empathy for animals
- Conducting 97 readings and classroom visits
- Training 186 new volunteers, teachers, and educators through 10 workshops
- Hitting a new milestone in children reached through the RedRover Readers program to date: approximately **131,327** total children

Since 1985, hundreds of humane organizations and animal advocates have used *Kind News*™ magazine to strengthen humane education in their communities.

Kind News is an eight-page, full-color RedRover publication that inspires kids to be curious, helpful, and kind to people and animals around them. The publication is available in two reading versions: Kind News, Jr. for grades K-2 and Kind News for grades 3-6, and is distributed five times throughout the school year. RedRover Relief

PROVIDES FINANCIAL AND EMOTIONAL SUPPORT to good Samaritans, animal rescuers, and pet parents to help them care for animals who need emergency veterinary care. The program also offers grants and resources to help domestic violence survivors and their pets escape abuse, and grants to homeless shelters seeking to develop a pet-friendly housing program.



- 553* pets received urgent veterinary treatment with \$157,971 in financial assistance
- 5,810 animals were helped through consultation and other referrals from RedRover staff
 - *includes grants awarded and pets helped through RedRover's pilot Access to Veterinary Care Fund

REDROVER LAUNCHED A PILOT PROGRAM CALLED THE **REDROVER RELIEF**ACCESS TO VETERINARY CARE FUND IN 2023,

thanks to a generous donation from The Boca Fund. The pilot grant program initially targeted assisting two veterinary clinics in underserved communities, or with clients that identify as underserved, and the model has proven to be both successful and replicable. In 2024, we expanded to support four veterinary clinics across the United States. Each clinic receives a sizable grant so they can distribute funds to clients in greatest need. These clinics adhere to the RedRover Relief Urgent Care grant guidelines, bridging financial and resource gaps and making it faster and easier for families to attain lifesaving veterinary care for their pets.

Not only are we helping families who receive Access to Veterinary Care grants, but it also increases the number of pets we were able to help through our RedRover Relief Urgent Care grant program — the time and funding we would have spent administering these grants are now able to be spent helping even more pets through our Urgent Care grant program.

We're happy to share that in 2024, four veterinary clinics distributed immediate and critical veterinary care to 58 pets through the Access to Veterinary Care grants, keeping these families together in times of greatest need. ♥



- 280 animals escaped abuse and 8,822 nights of pet boarding were provided through RedRover's Safe Escape grant program
- 7,440 estimated pets of domestic violence survivors helped through RedRover's Safe Housing grant program

RedRover Responders

SHELTERS AND CARES for animals displaced by natural disasters and other crises, provides hands-on assistance with building pet housing for domestic violence survivors, and offers community assistance for animals in need in the United States and Canada.

- **2,541** animals in crisis were helped through emergency sheltering and care services
- **437** more animals were helped through expert advice and valuable resources from RedRover staff
- **2,960** hours of volunteer work providing direct sheltering and animal care services
