stories and group discussion. The workshop is now offered online; this new format allows educators to take the training on their schedule and go at their own pace.

20 Years After Katrina: OHONORING THE Past, Preparing for the Future

THE MEMORIES OF HURRICANE KATRINA STILL LINGER — THE DESPERATION, THE HEARTBREAK,

AND THE RESILIENCE. For pet owners, the storm was a nightmare that tested the unbreakable bond between families and their beloved pets. RedRover, at the time known as United Animal Nations (UAN), sprang into action, deploying RedRover **Responders** volunteers from across the country and Canada to come together to support those affected by Hurricane Katrina and Hurricane Rita. Many animals were saved, some families were reunited, and our collective experiences helped shape the future and our approach to disaster response. Out of this crisis,

the National Animal Rescue and Sheltering Coalition (NARSC) was formed. RedRover is proud to be a founding member of NARSC, which aims to improve response coordination, develop emergency response best practices, and improve the field. Fast forward 20 years after Hurricane Katrina, we honor the lives lost, the lives saved, and remain committed to our mission of bringing animals and their people from crisis to care.

A Look Back From 20 Years

- August 29, 2005, Hurricane Katrina made landfall
- More than 1,300 people lost, with thousands more people and their beloved animals displaced
- 44% of the people who refused to evacuate during Katrina did so because they could not evacuate with their animals: their family



- Three-month-long emergency response to both Hurricanes Katrina and Rita, with daily calls for six weeks
- More than 400 United Animal Nations volunteers and 15 veterinarians cared for and rescued 2,100 animals in 6 locations in Mississippi, Louisiana, and Texas
- 40 states and Canada represented in our staff and volunteers
- Hundreds more people made donations that enabled us to purchase needed supplies, equipment, and medicine, and to support animal agencies that were decimated by the storm
- \$255,000 disbursed by UAN in hurricane relief grants to bring additional help to animal victims and the people who love them
- More than four dozen dogs were reunited with their owners, and those who weren't reclaimed were transferred to long-term foster homes and given a second chance with a loving family



More than \$500,000 Granted for Safe Housing

WE'VE AWARDED 12 SAFE HOUSING

GRANTS for a total of \$557,087 in our first grant round of 2025! Now, six domestic violence (DV) shelters, three animal shelters, and three homeless shelters can create or expand programming for the pets of survivors and people experiencing homelessness.

RedRover Relief Urgent Care Grants
