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Access to Empathy, Planting Seeds of Kindness

DOG TRAINER AND FOUNDER OF HER OWN NONPROFIT, THE LIFE OF KAI,

to support homeless, rescued, and community pets, Julielani Chang has another passion that fosters empathy for others: being a **RedRover Readers** humane educator. RedRover Program Manager, Minhhan Takemoto, sat down with Julie to walk down her path to inspiring kindness for animals and children together.

Julie, what first inspired you to work in humane education?

A: As a dog trainer, I saw how hard it was to change adults' views of animals. I realized that planting seeds of empathy in children might create more compassionate adults. A lifelong love of books led me to the **RedRover Readers** program — my "Holy Grail."

How do you incorporate RedRover Readers into your work?

A: I use the program's question-based approach with both kids and pet guardians. Instead of lecturing, I tell stories and ask open-ended questions like, "What might your dog be feeling?" This gives people and animals more agency.

You've created empathy libraries and games for The Life of Kai. What drives that?

A: Books only matter if kids can access them. I place small empathy libraries along school routes, am building a digital library, and create "Kitty Detective" games to make humane concepts easy and fun.

What's next for you and your nonprofit work?

A: Partnering with college interns on narrated videos and, eventually, mentoring programs where older students guide younger readers to spread empathy even further.



"If I can plant seeds of kindness in children early, maybe that empathy will guide them as adults."

Can you share a moment of impact your work has had?

A: After readings, children often rush to tell parents simple but powerful takeaways like, "Dogs need water too!" Those impactful discoveries empower kids to act on their compassion.

In August, I joined the RedRover Responders volunteer team as we traveled to Tulsa, Oklahoma, to help the Humane Society of Tulsa with an alleged cruelty case. With more than 300 Maltese dogs and puppies in need of care, our team worked diligently to make sure they were given the attention and support they needed. Our daily tasks included preparing meals and feeding, cleaning cages and kennels, grooming, and my favorite part – providing plenty of chin scratches and belly rubs.

This was such a heartwarming experience, as it was noticeable how much better the dogs felt after their "spa treatments" with time and space to play. It shows how even the simplest of tasks can be extremely meaningful for animals in need.

They were so careful to interact with the dogs and pups in a way that aided their healing - not forcing any socialization, but letting the dogs approach them in their own time to build trust. Domestic Violence Awareness: 2025 and Beyond

AS THIS YEAR'S DOMESTIC VIOLENCE AWARENESS MONTH ENDS, we reflect on the progress of our 25 by 2025 campaign: our effort to help ensure that 25% of domestic violence (DV) shelters in the U.S. are pet friendly by the end of the year. With our partners from Greater Good Charities, Purina, and PetSmart Charities, we've focused the campaign on raising awareness of the link between human and animal violence and the importance of creating programming that recognizes and supports the human-animal bond. Not only has the campaign helped raise awareness and inspire advocacy across the country, but it has also sparked the opportunity for conversation and learning, providing information and resources to help more organizations that support people and pets to create this essential programming.

Now, just two months away from our campaign's deadline, we are at 19.5%! With your support, we've helped give more DV survivors the opportunity to find safety with their beloved pets. RedRover Reaches \$6 Million in Grants Supporting Pets

OUR SAFE HOUSING PROGRAM JUST REACHED A MAJOR MILESTONE!

Since the program's inception in 2012, we have distributed more than \$6 million in grant funding to support pets of domestic violence survivors and unhoused individuals. In the second grant round of 2025, seven grants were awarded to four domestic violence shelters and three homeless shelters to help them create or expand pet-friendly programs! Grants were awarded in the states of Arkansas, Florida, Louisiana, Missouri, Ohio, South Dakota, and Texas.

Greyson is Healing, Thanks to You! - Happy Tails

MARLENE AND HER FAMILY BEGAN **FEEDING A FERAL CAT AND HER**

YOUNG KITTEN when they ventured into her yard, and named the kitten Greyson. Greyson was no stranger to mischief, but this time, he was completely innocent. Overnight, a neighbor's two dogs escaped and approached Greyson and his mom as they slept on the porch. In all the chaos, Greyson had been bitten hard on the tail.

Their veterinarian said it was clear the tail could not be saved. Marlene's was a single-income household, and the



unexpected expense of an amputation surgery was more than they could handle alone. She applied for a RedRover Relief Urgent Care grant, sharing, "Greyson has always been a very happy kitty. We want to help him get his life back. If we can get help from your organization, it would be a huge blessing."

Supporters like you were the help they needed. Greyson was in surgery within a matter of days because of your support, protecting him from further pain and preventing potential complications like infection. After a few more days, he was back home where he belonged – with Marlene and her family.
